

THE ARMENIAN MASSACRES.

Turkish ex-Consul Asserts that the Porte Intends to Exterminate the Race by a Regular System.

LONDON, Aug. 30.—The Daily Mail publishes to-day an article written by Ali Nouri Bey, ex-Turkish Consul at Rotterdam, asserting that the massacre of Armenians by Kurds, which has just recommenced, is part of a regular system of extermination. He says:

"The number of Armenians killed will depend upon the outcry raised in Europe and the pressure brought to bear upon the Sultan. The same horrible process will be repeated year by year until all are killed."

WOULD-BE ALDERMAN WHIPPED

John Ghee, Weighing 240 Pounds, Thrashed by Henry Murphy of Half His Weight.

John Ghee, who is connected with the Bronx Company, which has a large print mills in Westchester County, and who is a candidate for Alderman in the Borough of the Bronx, weighs 240 pounds, yet was badly whipped in a personal encounter with Henry Murphy, private secretary to Assemblyman Cooley, who is only about half his weight and of very boyish appearance, at Schlitz's saloon, Boston Road and One Hundred and Seventy-seventh Street, yesterday afternoon.

Assemblyman Henry Geiger of the Thirty-fifth District was one of the party which was in the saloon when the talk turned upon the recent conversion of Mr. Ghee from the Republican to the Democratic Party. This started the row. They went outside of the barroom, when Ghee made a rush for Murphy, but the latter side stepped and landed a powerful blow on the face of the big man as he went by. Then they grappled and fell and rolled over and over on the ground, their fists going like locomotive pistons.

When at last they were separated each was covered with blood, and Dr. Frank Becker, who lives on the corner below, was called to attend the fighters. Ghee had many bruises to be attended to, but when they washed Murphy's face and hands it was found that all the blood on him was from Ghee, and that he bore no other mark of the contest, although the breath was nearly out of his body, because of his adversary's weight. No arrests were made.
