"The story of the Greek deportation s not yet generally known," said Mr. lackson. "Quietly and gradually the same treatment is being meted out to the Greeks as to the Armenians. "There were some two or three milion Greeks in Asia Minor at the outbreak of the war in 1914, subject to

Furkish rule. According to the latest reliable and authoritative accounts some seven to eight hundred thousand have been deported, mainly from the
