The Nationalists have apparently made up their minds, in case it is decided to permit the present Armen-ian Government to continue, not to oppose the grant to Armenia of suf-ficient territory to insure the forma-tion of a prosperous state with a port

on the Black Sea instead of isolating t behind impossible boundaries. Some of the Armenians, on the other hand, lay claim to the territory

from Erivan, in the Russian Ca t-casus, to Adana, just off the Medi-terranean, but others, recognizing the impossibility of securing the terri-tory to organize such a state, suggest abandoning the idea of recon-

stituting ancient Armenia. The members of the mission are leaving here today for Erzingan, Er-zeram and Erivan, where they will strike the railroad to Tiflis. It is

too early to anticipate the recommendations which the mission will make to the American delegation at the Peace Conference on the subject of Armenia. The members of the mission have been accumulating voluminous notes on various details of the problem.
